I am looking forward to seeing you in Charleston, SC this January 2012 for a very exciting meeting.

Rosemary Knapp, our divisional program officer, reports that the upcoming meeting will be the largest in history. We have 87 contributed papers/posters, including 48 entries for best presentation. We are co-sponsoring the society-wide symposium entitled "The Impacts of Developmental Plasticity on Evolutionary Innovation and Diversification" as well as co-sponsoring three regular symposia. 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Update on Division Awards for Best Presentation

Following the approval of the changes to our divisional bylaws, I am pleased to announce that both of our awards for best presentation at the annual meeting are now named after distinguished members of our division. The award for best oral presentation is the **Aubrey Gorbman Award**. The award for best poster presentation is the **Lynn Riddiford Award**.

Changes to the bylaws regarding eligibility requirements for these awards also were approved. To be eligible, competitors must be 1) a member of SICB and 2) a student-in-training member, a graduate student member, or an individual who has received their Ph.D. within 12 months of the competition. The work presented must be original and must have been carried out principally by the competitor presenting the paper.

Changes to NSF Proposal Process

The Directorate for Biological Sciences (BIO) of the National Science Foundation (NSF) has initiated new procedures for the submission and review of regular research proposals to the core programs within the Division of Molecular and Cellular Biosciences (MCB), Division of Environmental Biology (DEB), and Division of Integrative Organismal Systems (IOS). The changes for MCB were previously announced.

DEB and IOS will both implement an annual cycle of preliminary and full proposals beginning in January 2012. Preliminary proposals will be accepted in January. Following review by a panel of outside experts, each applicant will be notified of a binding decision to Invite or Not Invite submission of a full proposal. Please note that each investigator is limited to submitting two preliminary proposals a year to either Division, whether as a PI, co-PI or lead

senior investigator of a subaward.

All proposals submitted to DEB or IOS in response to the core program solicitations, and to the Research at Undergraduate Institutions (RUI) and Long-term Research in Environmental Biology (LTREB) solicitations, must pass the preliminary proposal stage. The only exceptions are LTREB Renewals. RAPIDs, EAGERS, conferences/workshops and supplemental funding requests will continue to be accepted at any time by IOS and DEB programs. Proposals submitted in response to special solicitations (e.g. BREAD, CAREER, CNH, EEID) will remain unaffected by these new review procedures. However, OPUS and RCN proposals will only be accepted by the core programs in DEB and IOS once a year at the August deadline for full proposals.

The inaugural NASCE meeting was held July 13-16, 2011 in Ann Arbor, MI. There were over 330 attendees and 234 abstracts. The program consisted of 20 symposia, including a 50th *General and Comparative Endocrinology* anniversary symposium, which DCE co-sponsored, seven plenary lecturers and seven workshops/panels. The next meeting will be held at the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México (UNAM), Campus UNAM-Juriquilla, Querétaro, Mexico in 2013 (dates to be announced).

I am very much looking forward to another stimulating SICB meeting in a beautiful city. I recently returned from the Program Committee meeting where we assembled the abstracts into sessions and also had a chance to tour the hotel and convention center facilities for our upcoming meeting in Charleston. The facilities are excellent.

Charleston is a beautiful city and there will be a complimentary shuttle service to take registrants back and forth from the Convention Center to downtown Charleston for dinner and sightseeing the evenings of January 4, 5 and 6. Check the website for "Notes from the Underground" regarding restaurants and things to do and see as the meeting gets closer. The Embassy Suites Hotel at the Charleston Area Convention Center is the meeting headquarters. The lodging cost at the Embassy Suites includes made-to-order warm breakfast and a complimentary 'happy hour' each evening, and the suites are spacious, which facilitates sharing a suite, making the meeting hotel a great value.

For members who might be interested in a babysitting service during the meeting, there is a survey related to potential needs as part of the registration form. In early November Burk and Associates will look at the survey results and report them to the Executive Officers. The Executive Officers will then determine if childcare will be available during the meeting based on the results of the survey. So if this service would be of interest to you, please complete the survey (and, of course, register for the meeting) as soon as possible.

In Charleston, DCE will be co-sponsoring the Society-wide Symposium "The Impacts of Developmental Plasticity on Evolutionary Innovation and Diversification" organized by Matthew Wund. DCE is also co-sponsoring three Regular Symposia: "Mangrove 'Killifish': an Exemplar of Integrative Biology" organized by Ed Orlando, Ryan Earley, Brian Ring and David Bechler; "EvoDevo Rides the Genomics Express" organized by Billie Swalla; and "Comparative Proteomics of Environmental and Pollution Stress" organized by Lars Tomanek.

We have a new addition to the meeting this year that we think many of you will find very useful for your research. Following up



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on discussions among several people at last year's meeting, we will be initiating the first of what we plan to be a regular series of workshops on new (or new to many of us) methods in statistics and other forms of data analysis. Erica Crespi has been working hard to get this idea off the ground at the Charleston meeting. So this year, we kick the series off with a statistics workshop on Survival Analysis. See a full description in Erica's section below.

SICB members identifying themselves as belonging to DCE submitted 87 abstracts, including 48 from students competing in our best student presentation competitions: The Aubrey Gorbman Award for best oral presentation and the inaugural year of the Lynn Riddiford Award for best poster presentation. Joe Casto has graciously volunteered to chair the judging again this year. Thank you Joe! With this many competitors, I know he will be looking to have as many of us help judge as possible! In addition to the abstracts for which an "H" topic (Regulatory Biology) was the first topic choice, many other abstracts had an H topic as their second or third choice. Thus, you can look forward to **more than 185 presentations** covering some aspect of endocrinology at the meeting. Comparative endocrinology, from molecular and cellular to ecological, will be well represented at the Charleston meeting.

As Mark Sheridan mentioned, this year's Bern lecture will be presented by Lynn Riddiford. Please plan to join us the Thursday evening of the meeting for her presentation and a social immediately following. Our divisional meeting will also be held Thursday before the Bern lecture.

Finally, I want to remind you that this year's meeting will again be a full 4 days (Wednesday-Saturday, plus the plenary session Tuesday evening). This year's meeting will be the largest in history, with 1,455 abstracts submitted, and total attendance is sure to be even higher. There will be sessions on endocrine topics on all days and

times of the meeting, and each day will include at least one DCE-sponsored symposium. So please plan to stay the entire time if your schedule at all permits.

Biostatistics Workshop at the Charleston SICB meeting:

"Survival Analysis: Not just for survival anymore"

While many researchers are trained with a firm foundation in general linear models, biostatistical methods are more diverse and are constantly improving. The days of the ANOVA and assumptions of linearity are gone! On **Wednesday, January 4 at 7:30-9:30pm**, Jesse Brunner of Washington State University will lead a workshop that will review the statistics, assumptions, and applications on survival analysis, an analytical tool that can be



applied to a variety of questions in comparative endocrinology, behavioral ecology, developmental biology, and biomechanics. Experimental designs amenable to using these statistics also will be discussed, and participants will receive instruction on how to run these analyses in the statistics package R. Participants will have the opportunity to bring their own data to work with, or work from practice datasets that will be provided. Look for more information about the workshop in the coming months.
